On the Monday morning after a delicious breakfast we had the choice of either exploring Jerez or visiting Cadiz. After we left the showground we hopped onto one of the many horse drawn carriages that were being driven around and visited the historic area but I know that quite a few of us took the carriages with bells jangling along the main road to the fair arena, a lovely experience.

Again in the afternoon we had a choice of exploring the area or visiting the Tio Pepé Bodega, which is what we did and thoroughly enjoyed it. We had a ride on a red noddy train around the site, saw thousands of casks full of sherry, some of them signed by very famous and royalty. The best part was the tasting after the tour, the sherry was delicious, so pleased we went back to the hotel for a lie down!! After another superb evening meal we returned to the horse fair arena where earlier in the evening we had sat and watched the most gorgeous horses and carriages being driven around with everyone looking brilliant in their typical Spanish riding costumes and the Senoritas in their stunning flamenco dresses (I must lose weight) it was all quite mind blowing especially with the noise of the crowds of people and music all around you.


